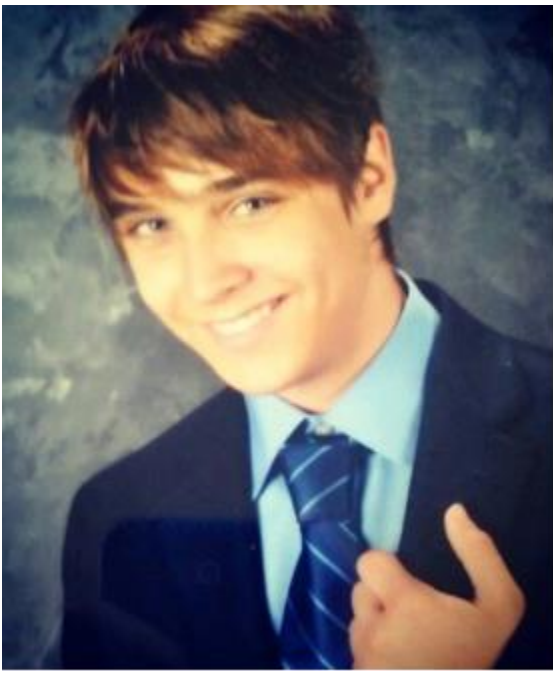

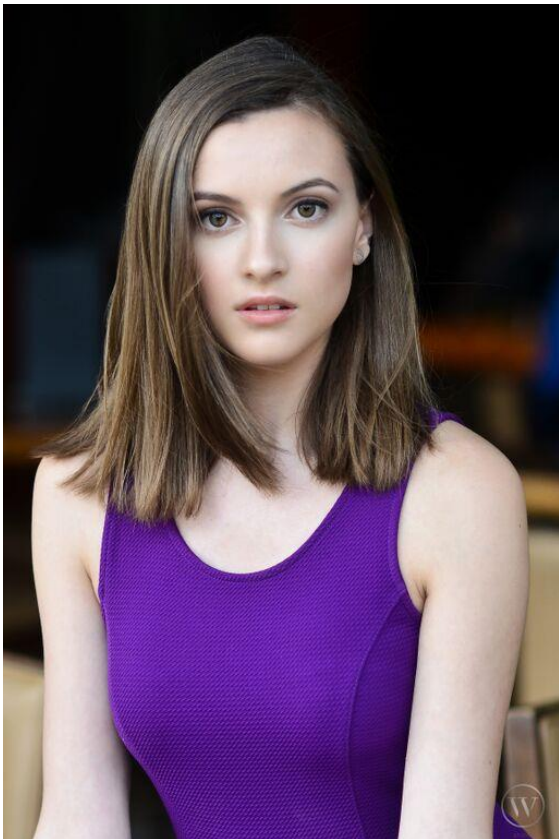

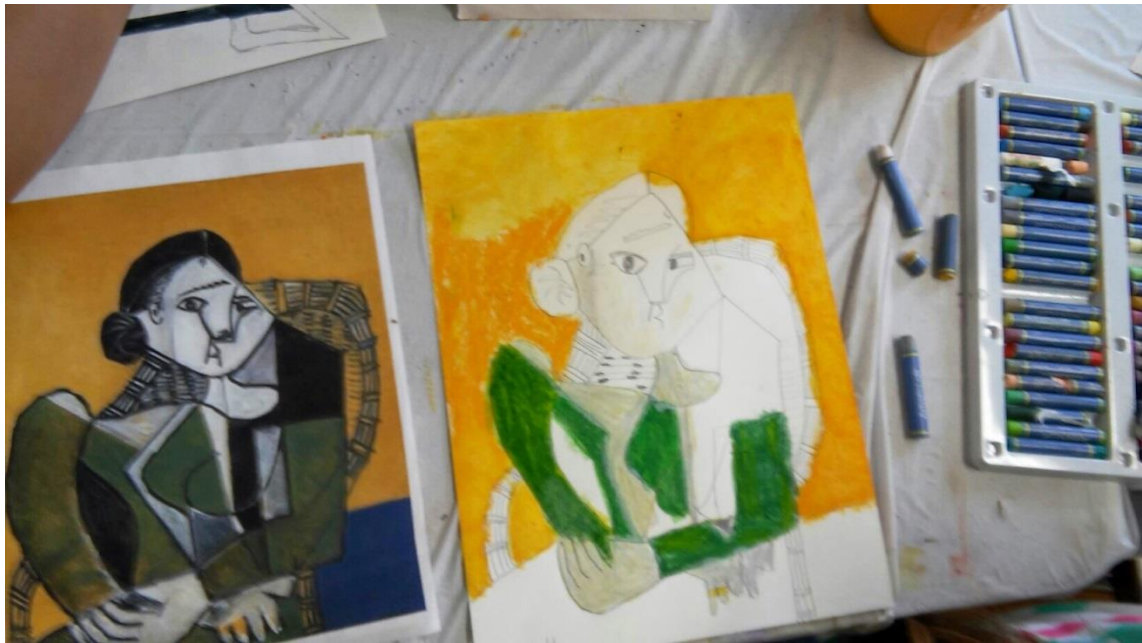

## Therapeutic Arts Program

Our Therapeutic Arts Program includes opportunities for all performing artists, and some visual arts educators interested in serving the elderly and at-risk youths.

With at-risk youth, art and music therapy are proven to be useful because of their inherent ability to surpass language barriers and achieve therapeutic gains in a safe environment.

Whether you'd like to volunteer to share your talents, you're a professional seeking to be paid to participate, or you're an educator seeking opportunity for your students, we'd like to hear from you.

Facilities that serve the elderly and at-risk youth are invited to contact us as well.

Measurable outcomes of the curriculum include work on cognitive and auditory processing and other sensory-motor, perceptual/motor, gross and fine motor skills, planning, sequencing, organization, attention span, problem solving, flexibility, socialization, impulse control, and more.





## Jackie Robbins, Cellist (Certified Clinical Musician)

Jackie has played in the Atlantic Classical Orchestra and The Palm Beach Opera orchestra locally, as well as playing for Tony Bennett, Bonnie Raitt, Dave Matthews, and more. She has become a staple in our Therapeutic Arts Program. She recently went back to school and has received her Level 1, Clinical Musician certification. Through a restricted grant specifically to support her work, she has been able to use her talents as healing properties to improve the lives of others. As a result of this special A4AC restricted donation, Robbins will complete at least 40 Therapeutic Arts program services and plans to continue as long as donations that support the program are available.

She has completed countless therapeutic care services at Treasure Coast Hospice for people at the end of their lives, and in the Intensive Care Unit at Martin Health Systems. She additionally uses her talent in a therapeutic way at assisted living facilities both locally and nationally.

Jackie's services were requested as this patient was admitted to Treasure Coast Hospice Care. It was Rosh Hashana and the family asked her to play High Holy Day prayers and melodies for him. He is pictured here with his wife. They are both eternally grateful for the gift of music that Jackie gave them.

Jackie recounts a memorable experience she had through the Therapeutic Arts Program, *"One day I was playing for an elderly woman. The patient closed her eyes within 30 seconds of my playing and didn't open them again for six minutes. Her breathing got slower, her twitching leg movement almost stopped, and a smile was on her face while she nodded her head to the music. The nurses had told me she was very agitated and perhaps she could use the company and some music to calm her down before they tried giving her some medication to reduce her anxiety. For the entire time I was there she became increasingly relaxed. She only opened her eyes once at the end to tell me how kind it was for me to do this for her and how my presence and music made her feel a sense of serenity that she doesn't get to experience too often."*



According to research by the American Music Therapy Association:

- “Musical elements and structures provide a sense of security and familiarity in the music therapy setting, encouraging individuals with Autism Spectrum disorder to attempt new tasks in a predictable but malleable framework.”
- “The rhythmic component of music is very organizing for the sensory systems of individuals diagnosed with autism. As a result, auditory processing and other sensory-motor, perceptual/motor, gross and fine motor skills can be enhanced through music therapy.”
- “Music therapy interventions can address development in cognitive, behavioral, physical, emotional, and social skills. Music therapy can also facilitate development in communication and sensorimotor skills.”



According to research by the American Art Therapy Association:

- “Art therapy provides real relief; a visual tool for communication, a window to the imagination, and a motivation to make connections. Art therapists are fluent in providing high-quality, visual, sensory-rich opportunities for learning for individuals with Autism Spectrum disorders.” – Nicole Martin, ATR
- “The creative process of art making allows for a child to move into the psychosocial stage of industry vs. inferiority. During this period, a child with ASD can use the creative process to enhance competency and mastery, allowing for positive development of their self-esteem and relationship skills.” – Dr. Laura JJ Dessauer, ATR-BC
- “Art therapy is beneficial and enjoyable treatment because of its inherent ability to surpass language barriers and achieve therapeutic gains in a safe zone. Art therapy helps participants gain self-esteem, learn social cues and norms, identify nonliteral and non-verbal language, and advance comfortable interpersonal relationships.”

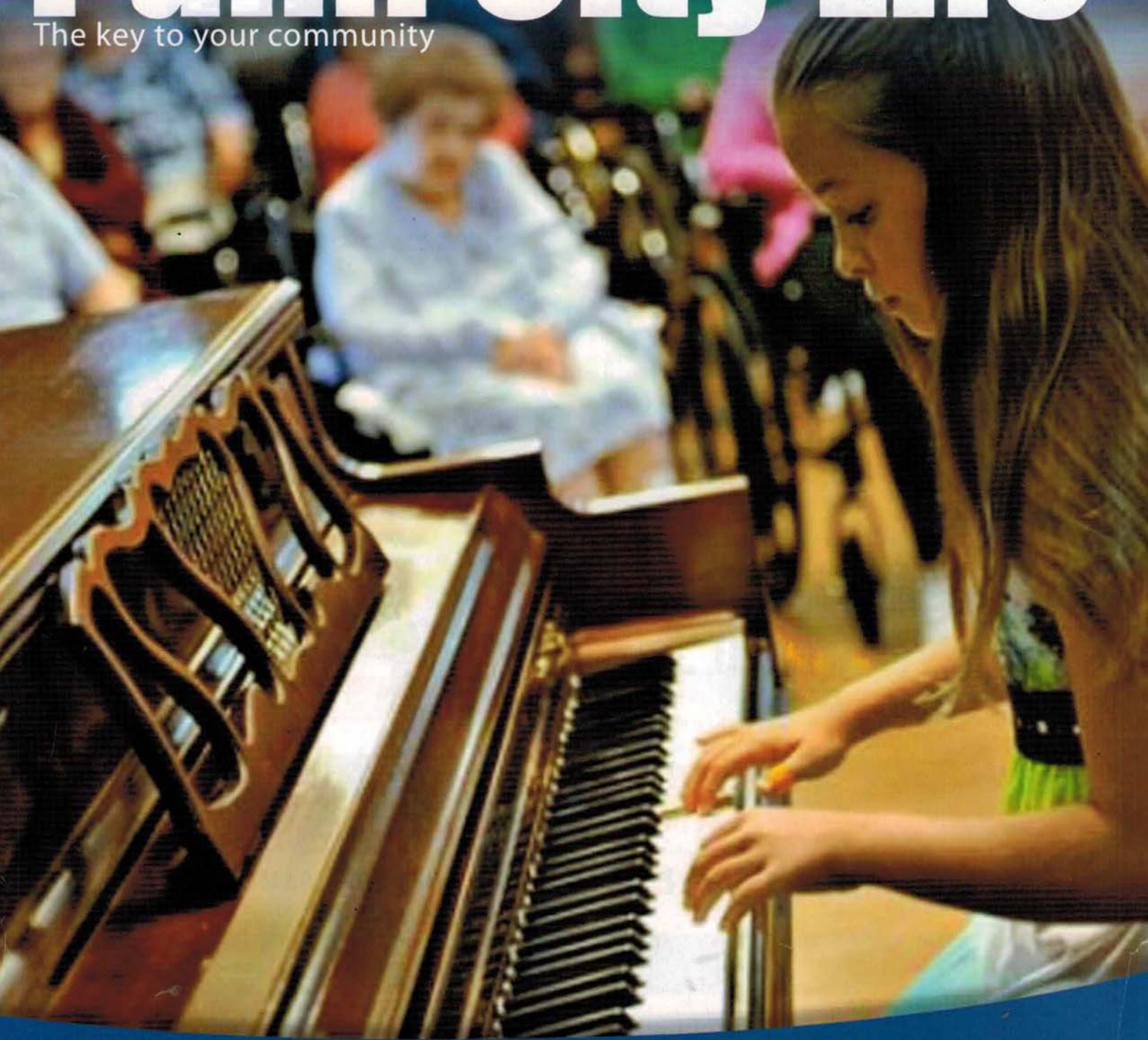

# Artists for a Cause Improves Our Area Utilizing the Arts

*Local nonprofit organization fights poverty, homelessness, health concerns and more, while also promoting the arts.*

**A**rtists for a Cause is a Stuart based nonprofit that improves communities through artistic endeavors. The organization takes on important issues like poverty, homelessness, health concerns and more, using the arts as a catalyst to produce incredible results and creatively build better communities.

While some of the organization's programs help artists and charities get the most of their collaboration, others allow Artists for a Cause to produce results directly by feeding the poor, healing the sick and finding unique artistic solutions to fill community need. Since its beginnings in 2009, Artists for a Cause has created paid and educational opportunities for hundreds of artists seeking to use their talents for community improvement.

## History

When his mother died of cancer while still in her 50s, international countertenor Terry Barber wanted nothing more than to fight cancer. Using his talent he began partnering with

one of the largest nonprofits in the country, The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. As part of his outreach campaign, Barber performed at several benefits events and dedicated his first solo album to his mother with all the proceeds from its initial release going to the organization. In 2008, he was nominated for a "Man of the Year" award for his dedication and hard work.

It was this experience as a volunteer for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society that gave Barber the idea to kick-start Artists for a Cause. "Visual and performing artists want to use their talent to improve communities, but they deserve an advocate" Barber said. In order to help artists to use their talents to solve community problems, he founded the organization in 2009. It now operates with a national network, moving from hundreds toward thousands and offers free registration for visual and performing artists of all levels. "When I retire from my own touring and recording career I know I'll still be proud to help artists as they seek to improve our world. If you want a creative solution to our world's problems, ask an artist," said Terry Barber, founder and executive director for Artists for a Cause.

## Current Programs

Current programs have outreach from Palm Beach to Vero Beach with the most effect in Martin County, Florida, where the home office is based. It won't be long before all programs are fine tuned and positioned to have a national effect.

Artists for a Cause currently runs a musical instrument donation initiative named after one of the organization's champions, Elizabeth Lahti, who has a history of donating musical instruments to children in need. Elizabeth Lahti Donation Closet makes essential supplies available to children in need by col-

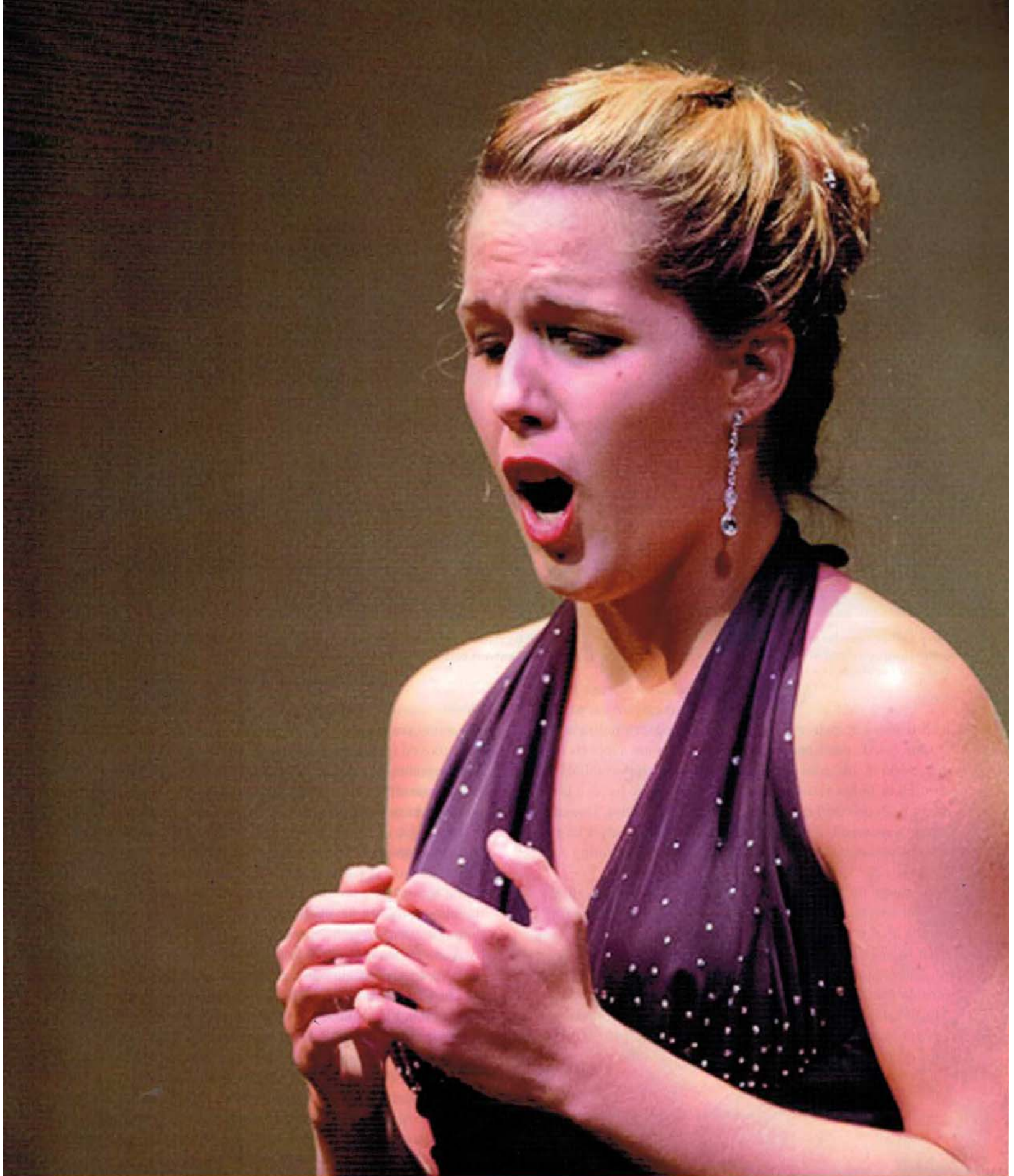

lecting musical instruments and dance shoes for redistribution.

The A4AC need-based scholarship program supports children seeking arts education opportunities – Opportunities, according to James Catterall, which are proven to have a lasting effect both on brain development, and core values. Dozens of students received training in 2012 at Martin County's largest arts education institution the StartStruck Performing Arts Center.

Through its A4AC School Clubs, the organization allows current artistically inclined students to become mentors for youths in at-risk communities using the arts as a means to confront social and emotional struggles.

And beginning this fall, Barber will be visiting schools in Florida where music programs have been cut back in order to educate and inspire with a new lecture recital and question and answer version of his national tour program called, "Classical for Schools." "The real estate market was the reason that

Florida was among the top states for support of arts and culture just a few years ago," said Barber. "For that same reason we have moved to 47th in the nation. This is one of the reasons that our programs all have an arts education element. We are positioning ourselves to combat the long term effects of statewide budget cuts on our children."

Dance for Food is a series of five contemporary dance performances in 2013, from Palm Beach to Vero Beach, where admission cost is nonperishable food donations. In the month of the harvest, the program creates professional and educational opportunity for hundreds of dancers and raises more food donations that our entire program budget would buy. Produced by Anna Preston, the hour-long performances include the best work of several local dance companies.

Therapeutic Arts sends the healing power of the visual and performing arts to those who wouldn't be able to access them otherwise. Last year, 50 musical performances resonated with elderly people in nursing homes and assisted living facilities from West Palm Beach to Ft. Pierce with a few "satellite" performances from artists in other states shining a light on the organization's growth. In 2013, the program is incorporating more than just musical arts, and will serve those in need with additional performing and visual arts experiences.

### **Hope for Freedom**

Students from the Artists for a Cause Club at Southfork High School teamed up with performers from Preston Contem-

porary Dance Theater and StarStruck Performing Arts Center to hold a benefit performance April 13 in order to raise awareness about human trafficking.

Hope for Freedom guest speaker Samantha Carannante informed guests about the prevalence and severity of human trafficking activities in our state, which is currently ranked among the top five nationwide for reported cases. Modern-day slavery is a growing problem worldwide, recently rising to the second most common criminal activity behind the illegal drug trade.

Eileen Walentin, the teacher-sponsor for the Artists for a Cause Club at Southfork High School, played a key role in coordinating the event. "The student performances, video presentations, guest speakers and student visual art came together to make for a poignant evening that could not help but touch the hearts and minds of both the audience, and the student participants. We hope to have this again next year, and based on the success of this year's event, increase our audience," said Walentin. Michelle Rodanes, director of operations at Artists for a Cause, also expressed her delight over the benefit's success. "We are so proud of our students. This year, they have done everything from sharing their talents at local arts festivals, to serving as mentors for younger peers in at-risk communities. At Artists for a Cause we strongly believe that art can be the solution to community problems ranging from poverty to health concerns. As proven by this event, it can also be a wonderful tool to help raise awareness about pressing issues like human trafficking."

# How to Get Involved

## Become a volunteer
